
Sunday Reflection

Fr. Ed Smith

Ezekiel 18:25-28; Philippians 2:1-11; Matthew 21:28-32

Jesus knows how to work a crowd better than anyone. As soon as Jesus asks: "What is your opinion?" to the chief priests and the elders of the people, we know we are in for something interesting, and that Jesus will expect a response - from them and from us. Today's story concerns the problem that occurs when what we say differs from what we do. The parable for this weekend teaches a profound lesson about honesty and commitment. After being told by their father to go and work in the vineyard, one son said, "Yes, I will go," but never showed up. Not only did he disobey his father's wishes but lied to him in the bargain. Now, the other son responded "No, I will not go," but thought better of it, changed his mind and went into the vineyard after all. What is going on here? Perhaps Jesus is letting us know that it is part of human nature to grow and to change, and that the important this is to think about what we say and do, so that we can become what God made us to be: workers in His vineyard of the world. This takes humility and an openness to God's word, which can penetrate our hearts, illuminate our lives, and even change our minds! Jesus continues to work crowd in this day and age, and we are part of this great crowd. As He did so long ago, He asks questions, waits for our response, and wants us to see that we can change, and that in following the will of our Father in heaven, we are blessed with lives of hope, meaning and peace. So, we never have to be afraid of being asked a question from Jesus. He does it for our own good!



Is This A Person?



Let's begin at the beginning. The first question in the old Baltimore Catechism was: "Who made you?" And the answer was: "God made me!" Think about it: All of us have been created by God to know, love and serve Him in this life, and to be happy with Him forever in heaven. Therefore, each of us has eternal value from the moment of our conception; from the moment "God made me". And consider this even in physical terms: at conception we already have a genetic completeness which has begun its growth toward adulthood. This is a fact. For some to argue that human life does not begin at conception is to be left with the question: "If not at conception, then when?" There is no real answer to this. Life begins at conception. Any other attempt at an answer makes no physical, logical or moral sense.

The "Right to Reproductive Freedom" amendment in Ohio uses the term "fetal viability". By this they mean that human life can only be acknowledged when the fetus can survive 'on its own'. But this statement seems both clumsy and arbitrary. After all, the moment of "viability" does not mean the arrival of anything new that is essentially human that was not already present in the genetic make-up of the fetus beforehand. And it does not account for the fact that medical science is already amazingly capable of caring for a fetus long before it can survive 'on its own', and often does so.

The amendment promotes the "right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions": meaning that a person has rights over their own body. True, but this does not change the fact that within that body exists another body with an inalienable right to life that is absolute.

Some people also argue that when the Church works for laws that prohibit abortion, it is an attempt to legislate morality and religion. This is false. Law exists to protect the life of the people. However, in allowing abortion, the state is deciding that one category of life is not worthy of its protection. Thus, in civil terms, abortion is a form of discrimination. The Church is called to fight this evil.

Finally, in response to the argument that "many people in the United States favor abortion", remember that the very highest function of the law is to uphold a principle in the face of dissenting popular opinion. Our nation must be better than taking the easy way out to keep some people satisfied [think of the slavery laws in the past]. The Church must hold our country accountable. So, let us pray for all those whose lives are at risk. Remember: "God made me...and everyone else!"

Creating Sacred Spaces: The Role of the Home Altar in Family Prayer

Family prayer is at the heart of growing a fruitful and healthy domestic Church. But it can often be difficult to prioritize or even to pray as a family. When you do, where is the best place? This is an important decision. First it is helpful to consider the nature of space and how it helps us to pray. For example the bedroom is situated away from the bustle of daily life to promote uninterrupted rest. On the other hand the family room is the most accessible with plenty of furniture to accommodate all the members of the family and with space to participate in activities. Each room is placed in relation to the others and is designed to help serve a certain purpose.

When considering a good prayer space we must remember that God created us to be both spiritual beings and bodily beings. Material spaces help us to pray and to direct our senses to God rather than becoming distracted. In the home there is a long history of the home altar. Home altars come from an ancient practice. Abraham erected altars as he lived in the Promised Land to offer worship and thanksgiving to God (Gen 12:7). While the Church was persecuted in its earliest years the faithful would gather in homes to celebrate the Mass. As early as the second century families would place a cross on the eastern wall of their house. It was from the east that the Gospels indicated the Son of Man would reappear (Matt 24:30). This would become the center of family prayer.

Today the family altar serves a similar purpose. It is modeled after the altar in the

sanctuary of the Church. This is because the altar is where the highest form of prayer occurs, the Mass. At the same time altars are places where devotional practices are often centered. Many older Churches had multiple altars, often dedicated to various saints and patrons where the faithful could come and pray for their intercession. This is especially true of the altars traditionally dedicated to Mary and Joseph, typically situated on either side of the sanctuary. The movement from public devotional spaces within the Church structure to a private prayer space is a simple next step.

But why call it a home altar since nothing is being sacrificed on it, such as animals as in the time of Abraham, or the sacrifice of the Eucharist at Mass? Home altars don't try to replicate those aspects of sacrifice. But as the Psalmist says "my sacrifice, O God, is a contrite spirit; a contrite, humbled heart, O God, you will not scorn. (Ps 51:17)." So any prayer, praise or contrition, joy or sorrow, involves sacrifice, which is embodied by an altar. When you pray you are putting into practice your baptismal graces as a member of the common priesthood to give God a sacrificial offering of your spirit. The home altar brings this reality to the forefront of your prayer and connects the private prayer and sacrifice of the family with the public prayer and sacrifice of the Church.


What makes up a home altar? A home altar can be a table or shelf, decorated with a white cloth and crucifix. As your own personal prayer space endeavor to make it unique to your family devotions. Involve your children so that they have an investment in the space and can make it their own. Include candles, a bible, images of patron saints, images of Mary, Jesus and Jospeh. Prayer cards and rosaries. Anything that will help the family pray.

These spaces also serve as place of catechesis where parents can teach their children by example. The home altar itself teaches because it is a space that is dedicated to God and that is shown respect by parents. This shows children that God is important. Seeing an altar at home that is treated with reverence and respect will help them to understand the importance of the altar and what occurs on it during

Mass. Parents can use different Images of saints and devotionals throughout the year to instruct children. You can customize the altar during Advent and Christmas to teach about the birth of Jesus, and during Lent and Easter to teach about the death of Jesus and His resurrection. Each month can be dedicated to a different lesson or prayer that can form the focus of catechesis.

As you go about your day a well-placed and appointed home altar is a constant reminder of the reality of the family as a domestic church. It is a call to pray and to center all things in Christ. This is crucial for cementing a proper understanding of Catholic prayer and teaching in the lives of children, and it promotes faith and harmony within the family. Inviting God into our homes prepares the family for the busy world. The home can be a place to rest and spiritual renewal each day and a place for all the members of your family. Eventually your spiritual horizon will grow and embrace the wider Christian community of the parish where the family can put into practice the command to love your neighbor.

Example Prayer Space

Pray Together:

An Act of Faith, Hope, and Love

Jesus, I believe in you. Jesus, I hope in you. Jesus, I love you. radical solidarity

In the Gospel of John, shortly before he is to suffer his Passion, Jesus proclaims to his disciples: "I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another" (Jn 13:34). And it is love for one another that Jesus says will be the identifying characteristic of his disciples.

The Church's entire social doctrine is guided by the fundamental principle that every human life has innate dignity and incomparable value: "Every human being is the object of God's infinite tenderness, and he himself is present in their lives." As disciples of Christ, we are called to make a sacrificial gift of ourselves for the sake of our neighbor, for "to love someone is to desire that person's good and to take effective steps to secure it."

Fulfilling Christ's command to love one another takes shape in our practice of solidarity. Solidarity is the means by which we put our love for others into action, making the good of others our own. Solidarity "is not a feeling of vague compassion or shallow distress at the misfortunes of so many people... On the contrary, it is a firm and

John 13:34

persevering determination to commit oneself to the common good...to the good of all and of each individual, because we are all really responsible for all."

In reaction to the overturning of *Roe v. Wade*, some areas of the country now protect the child in the womb, while others are doing all they can to increase access to abortion. At this critical moment, we have been entrusted with new *opportunities* and new *responsibilities* to build a civilization of authentic love. Our culture claims to offer women so-called "choice," but ultimately abandons mothers to make tragic and painful decisions alone. We must lead the way in showing the alternative: "*In firmly rejecting 'pro-choice' it is necessary to become courageously 'pro woman,' promoting a choice that is truly in favor of women. ... The only honest stance,*

in these cases, *is that of radical solidarity with the woman*. It is not right to leave her alone." ⁴

Experience shows that when a mother is supported, "she is even capable of heroism." Radical solidarity compels us to come alongside vulnerable mothers in profound friendship, compassion, and support for both them and their

preborn children. It requires us to address the fundamental challenges that lead an expectant mother to believe she is unable to welcome the child God has entrusted to her. We must do all we can to provide mothers, children, and families with the support they need to flourish. This cannot be accomplished by laws or policy alone, but requires the continual transformation of our own hearts, recognizing in every person the face of Christ, and placing their needs before our own.

Radical solidarity "refers to something more than a few sporadic acts of generosity. It presumes the creation of a *new mindset*." A culture of radical solidarity "gets involved by word and deed in people's daily lives... and it embraces human life, touching the suffering flesh of Christ in others." We each have our particular gifts, role, and obligation within the Body of Christ to help build a culture of life. We must honestly ask ourselves, "What radical, out-of-the-ordinary, actions have I taken to help a pregnant or parenting mother in need, or to proactively contribute to a culture of life in some other way?"

Inspired by Christ's own example of love, may we "enter fully into the fabric of society, sharing the lives of all, listening to their concerns, helping them materially and spiritually in their needs, rejoicing with those who rejoice, weeping with those who weep." May we work together to bring about a culture of life through radical, sacrificial, Christ-like love.



Question & Answers

Catholic Vs. Protestant Bibles

Question:

Why are Catholic and Protestant Bibles different?

Answer:

Since the earliest days of the Church, Christians used a Greek translation of the Old Testament known as the Septuagint. This collection of the texts of the Hebrew Scriptures included 46 books. At the time of the Protestant Reformation in the 1500s, the Protestant reformers began to create their own translations of the Bible (into local languages) and some began to question why the Jewish Scriptures would have included texts that were written in Greek, because, they assumed, the only valid Jewish Scriptures would have been written in Hebrew. And so, they decided to remove seven books from the Old Testament: Baruch, Sirach, 1 and 2 Maccabees, Tobit, Judith and Wisdom (as well as portions of the Books of Daniel and Esther). This means that the Protestant Old Testament only includes 39 books, while Catholic Bibles continue to include those original 46 books. Both Catholic and Protestant Bibles include 27 books and letters in the New Testament.

We now know that this experience can cause guilt and shame after making the difficult decision to have an abortion. 
