Sunday Reflection

Fr. Ed Smith

2 Chronicles 36:14-16, 19-23; Ephesians 2:4-10; John 3:14-21

There are countless important and well-known statements from the Gospels, but John 3:16 is probably one that we see most often: it is on billboards, on barns and even on signs at sporting events. The text of this citation is found in this weekend's Gospel: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, that everyone who believes in Him might not perish but might have eternal life." We could spend the rest of our lives meditating on that one verse of scripture. In it we find meaning, hope, and, particularly this Sunday, joy. Today is called "Laetare" Sunday by the Church. During this season of Lent, we take a moment to rejoice [Laetare] just as we do in Advent ["Gaudete" Sunday] in the gift of Jesus, the gift of faith in Him, and the gift of eternal life because of Him. This is a lot to be joyful about! But this does not mean that we forget that there are difficulties in our lives and in our world. In the first reading from Chronicles, we see that the Israelites are in exile and their temple is destroyed, resulting from their infidelity to the Lord. For seventy years they were lost. But in God's own good time, and with great mercy, they are brought back home, the temple is rebuilt, and their covenant with God is renewed. This is a cause for joy. But, in Jesus, we have an even deeper cause for joy: God enters history as a man, proclaims the message of salvation in a language that we can understand, and shows us that love is more powerful than sin or even death. This is why, during these final weeks of Lent, we celebrate "Laetare" Sunday. Even the word reminds us to "lighten up"! The purple vestments are put aside for a moment, and we wear the color rose: a lighter shade of purple, with white [the color of rejoicing] added to it [although there is also that bit of red to remind us that life can involve suffering]. So, let's remember always that we are people who need God, who must be realistic about our faults, and be working hard to turn away from sin. But at the same time, let's not forget to rejoice, because God does love us so much that He sent His only Son. Remember: this is the heart of our faith, not just a sign at a sporting event or on the side of a road!



Communion of Three Persons: A Deeper Look into the Trinitarian Praise in 'Glory Be'

One of the prayers we pray as Catholics at the end of a decade of the Rosary or in the Liturgy of the Hours is the "Glory Be" prayer or "Gloria Patri" in Latin. It's called the Minor Doxology, where "doxa" means glory in Greek, and doxology means an expression of praise to God. There is also a Major Doxology, the Gloria in Excelsis Deo, but that's for another article.

Most of you are probably familiar with prayer formulas like ACTS (Adoration, Contrition, Thanksgiving Supplication), RAPT (Repentance, Adoration, Petition, Thanksgiving) or PATH (Praise, Apology, Thanksgiving, Hope). We understand asking for forgiveness of sins we've committed, we understand thanking God for what He's done and we understand asking Him for things, but it's the praise and adoration piece that usually doesn't come easy.

In Catechism 2639, it tells us that "Praise is the form of prayer which recognizes most immediately that God is God. It lauds God for his own sake and gives him glory, quite beyond what he does, but simply because HE IS." Giving God praise for who He is and not for what He does for us can be a bit uncomfortable. Try it for a minute and see if it doesn't feel strange. Don't thank Him for anything He's done for you, that's a prayer of Thanksgiving, just praise Him for who He is. A little awkward.... right? Yet, we are all called to praise God, and this little "Glory Be" prayer is perfect for that.

The prayer can be traced back to somewhere in the fourth century when it was added to the end of each Psalm in the Liturgy of the Hours prayed by monks. In the Middle Ages, as praying the Rosary became a popular devotion, it was added to the end of each decade. Different forms of doxology are prayed at the end of the Our Father in Mass and at the end of the Collect prayer at the beginning of the Mass. All of this demonstrates the importance of praising God always and giving Him glory.

In the Glory Be prayer, we give all glory to God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit in the first line of the prayer: "Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit." We praise God for who He is, one God, but a communion of three persons, the Holy Trinity, and we give equal praise to all three. In praying these words, we turn from focusing on ourselves toward focusing on how awesome God is and who He is. Often, we use the word glorious to describe, as Miriam Webster defines it, something marked by great beauty or splendor. Glorious snowcapped mountains, glorious fields of colorful flowers, and glorious weather all evoke perfection and beauty, so calling God glorious is only right, since He is the creator of all perfection and beauty.

The final line of the Glory Be prayer says, "As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end." The Father, Son and Holy Spirit have existed for all time; they are uncreated. CCC 198 says "...for God is the First and the Last, the beginning and the end of everything." God's glory has always existed, exists now, and will continue to exist forever. If God is uncreated and has existed for all time, then it reasons to follow that His word, what He teaches us, and the covenant promises He made to us will all exist forever. How awesome is God if He lets us praise Him for who He is and play just a small part in His plan and enjoy His enduring power and love forever?

So next time you sit down to prayer, give glory and praise to God for who He is by praying:

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, as it was in the beginning is now, and ever shall be world without end. Amen.

Light brings a certain responsibility with it. It seems to compel productivity. Furthermore, there's no hiding in the light. Any photographer worth his salt knows how to manipulate it, highlighting the good and casting some merciful shade on the bad.

As we enter into the fourth week of Lent, we're getting so close to the main event. Can we handle the light that will come on Easter morning, bursting into the tomb as the stone is rolled away? Can we keep ourselves from hitting the "snooze" button on our souls, and sit up to face the dawn of a new day?

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Question & Answer

Differences Between Priests & Brothers

Question:

What's the difference between priests and brothers, friars, etc.?

Answer:

The distinctions titles and categories used for priests and the male members of religious communities can be confusing, especially since the categories can sometimes be intertwined as a man can be both a priest and a monk, or a brother and a friar. So, to help to piece the puzzle together, it's important to begin by noting some basic distinctions:

The distinction between priests (who are ordained for sacramental ministry) and brothers (who are nonordained members of religious communities and who are committed to lives of prayer and service).

Priests: A priest is a man who has been ordained for sacramental ministry and these fall into two categories: A) Diocesan (or Secular) Priests can either be attached to a diocese and who serve under a bishop. Their ministry is usually oriented toward pastoral service. B) Religious Priests are members of religious communities (like the Franciscans, Jesuits, Salvatorians, or Carmelites) and their lives are guided by the special mission and charism of their community. While both kinds of priest practice sacramental ministry, their spirituality and how they live out their priesthood can be very different.

Brothers: Brothers are non-ordained members of religious communities (such as those mentioned above) who live lives committed to prayer and service. Religious priests and brothers serve together in their communities and their ministries include much more than the care of parishes.

Monks, Friars, and Canons: These are broad categories that include religious priests and brothers, and each of these is connected to specific ways of life and spiritualities. ©LPi

The Uncomfortable Life in The Light

If you have ever been a woman over the age of 30 who stayed in a budget motel, you know the horror of awakening in a dark room, switching on the bathroom lights and screaming at the shriveled-up she-witch you find hiding there.

And you know the feeling of disappointment that blooms in the pit of your stomach as you realize the shriveled-up she-witch is your own reflection staring back at you beneath the merciless glare of overhead fluorescent lighting.

You may also know the relief of visiting a nice restaurant after dark and catching sight of yourself in the mirror. You lean forward, mesmerized by how different — how matte! How smooth! — the contours of your face look in what we call "forgiving light." But this turn of phrase is simply not correct. It is not light, and it does not forgive. It is darkness, and it merely conceals.

But it feels so much better, doesn't it? Salvation can feel like condemnation, when being lost is all you know. Sometimes it is so much more comfortable to live lost in the shadows.

It is possible to yearn for darkness. Darkness gives cover to so many things. The light has a harshness that can almost seem demanding, exposing. Light can bleach. Light can burn.

"Is this really me?" you think in that budget hotel bathroom, examining acne scars you never saw before and crow's feet that seem to have developed overnight. The answer is yes. Yes, that is really you, all of it, every inch. There's nothing to be afraid of, just step into the light and own it.
