

# Sunday Reflection

Fr. Ed Smith

#### Genesis 2:18-24; Hebrews 2:9-11; Mark 10:2-16


There are few moments as joyful as a wedding in the lives of families. They bring people together, they celebrate a new beginning, and they extol the beauty of love. It seems ironic that something so joyful can also be the cause of such difficult and contentious discussions. But this is the truth. People argue about marriage, what it is, why it is important, whether it lasts for life or not, and who is entitled to enter into it.

Today's topic comes from the first and third readings for this Sunday. Simply stated: What do we believe about marriage, and how do we, as Christians, respond to the sad reality of divorce? Let's face it: very few of us have not been affected by divorce, either in our own families or among our friends. It is a fact of life, and one that can cause much pain and grief. Periodically, one hears commentators speak of the problem of divorce as if it were a relatively modern phenomenon, but the very fact that Jesus addresses it directly in the Gospel shows us that this is not a new issue in the history of humanity.

It was even an issue long before the time of Jesus, going all the way back to the Book of Genesis, written centuries before the Gospel of St. Mark. But both examples are important in that they remind us that marriage is not easy, and that it never was. Both readings also remind us that it takes love, commitment, sacrifice and lots of hard work to make a marriage grow, deepen, and thrive. This does not mean that, sometimes, things do not work out, even though the couple entered into their marriage in good faith. Nor does it mean that, in certain circumstances, the couple should never have gotten married in the first place. Sadly, this does happen.

But these difficulties do not take away from the beauty, greatness and sanctity of a true and lasting Christian marriage. What a gift to the world this is. What an opportunity for heroic love. What a perfect image of Christ's love for His Church. So, even with marriage undergoing many questions these days, we can take great comfort knowing that this sacrament is, first of all, a gift from God, and therefore an opportunity to share in the deepest love humanly possible, and at the same time, become a radiant image of Jesus and his love for His people throughout the world.

# **Baptism: The Permanent Mark of Belonging to Christ**

Welcome to the Domestic Church Corner, where we will be exploring the seven Sacraments this year.

Most of us don't remember our baptism if we are "Cradle Catholics", and often don't understand the incredible significance of receiving that Sacrament during our infancy. Baptism, one of the Sacraments of Initiation, along with Confirmation and Eucharist, does what is says, it initiates us into the Church and so much more. The Catechism of the Catholic Church in 1257 says: "The Lord himself affirms that Baptism is necessary for salvation. He also commands his disciples to proclaim the Gospel to all nations and to baptize them. Baptism is necessary for salvation for those to whom the Gospel has been proclaimed and who have had the possibility of asking for this sacrament. The Church does not know of any means other than Baptism that assures entry into eternal beatitude; this is why she takes care not to neglect the mission she has received from the Lord to see that all who can be baptized are "reborn of water and the Spirit." God has bound salvation to the sacrament of Baptism, but he himself is not bound by his sacraments."

#### Effects

With our Baptism come the following effects:

- The forgiveness of all personal sins that were committed before Baptism and Original Sin and all punishment connected with that sin.
- When we are baptized, we become a new creation in Christ. When we are plunged in the waters of baptism, we die to our old self and arise out of the waters as a new creature.
- We become adopted sons and daughters of God. Children to the Father and broth-

ers and sisters to Christ.

• The Holy Spirit dwells in us.

- ${\scriptstyle \bullet}$  We are filled with sanctifying grace.
- We are incorporated into the Body of Christ, the Church, and become brothers and sisters of one another.
- We begin to share in the mission of Christ and become priest, prophet, and king.
- We receive a permanent spiritual mark on our soul, called a character, that claims us for Christ. We never repeat the Sacrament of Baptism because that character is permanent through all eternity. It's a sign that we belong to Christ.
- We are made citizens and heirs of heaven.

That list of what happens because of our Baptism is why as a lifelong Catholic, you were most likely baptized soon after you were born. Your parents cared for your spiritual needs just like they fed you and changed your diapers. Being a part of the Church, being free of the inherited Original Sin and being adopted into God's family are ways your parents cared for you spiritually.

#### Form and Matter

From learning about Sacraments last month, we know that every sacrament requires two things, form and matter. The form of a Sacrament is the words spoken and the matter, the physical substance(s) used for the Sacrament. "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." is the form of Baptism. Those are the words that must be spoken, and water must be poured over the recipient, either by pouring water over the head or immersing them totally in a font. Water is the only substance we can use to baptize, so diet Coke and weak iced tea are out. The Baptism rite also has an anointing with oil, a rejection of Satan, and vows that are made by the parents and godparents. The water used for baptism is blessed by the minister of the Sacrament, which can be either a priest or deacon. In an emergency and a case of imminent death, anyone can baptize with water and the form required.

Since we are a body and soul composite, we are also given some outward signs of Baptism such as a white garment, which signifies the soul being purified and transformed, a baptismal candle which signifies that we receive Christ's light within us, and an anointing with chrism, which means we are part of Christ's mission of salvation.

Finally, a word about the role of parents and godparents at an infant or child baptism. The parents, or guardians of the child, make the vow to raise the child in the Catholic faith and they make all the baptismal promises on behalf of the child.

Godparents have a huge role to play that consists of more than helping to hold the child or accept the lit candle. Godparents are to be role models of living the faith and if the parents cannot raise the child in the faith, the godparents take on that responsibility.

Check out the remaining bulletin issues in October for activities to reinforce what we have learned about Baptism. In November, we'll learn about Confirmation.

# I CAME SO THAT THEY MIGHT HAVE

During the Easter Vigil liturgy, the single flame of the Easter candle shines through the darkness. That small flame spreads as each person's candle is lit and the light of Christ is shared with others. Before we know it, the entire Church is ablaze with the warm glow of candlelight and the darkness has been vanquished.

We are each called by God to be that light of Christ that breaks through the darkness. We are called to be his disciples, continually transformed by our encounter with him and sharing in his mission. Jesus came that we might have *life*.

Part of the impetus for the Eucharistic Revival was a concern that some Catholics do not believe, or at least do not understand, that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist. Even though our human senses perceive bread and wine, the Eucharist is Jesus—body, blood, soul, and divinity. Similarly, many people do not realize or acknowledge the sanctity of human life when it is hidden in the womb. Both instances call for us to help others recognize these sacred gifts that may not be perceivable through our human senses. We need to help others understand that just because something may not be apparent to our eyes does not mean that it is not there or that it is not important.

We live in a society that rejects those who are weak, fragile, or vulnerable. Yet, it is precisely within these conditions that a person is most in "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

need of our care and protection. Pope Francis reminds us that "every child who, rather than being born, is condemned unjustly to being aborted, bears the face of Jesus Christ, bears the face of the Lord, who even before he was born, and then just after birth, experienced the world's rejection."<sup>1</sup>

The U.S. bishops have affirmed that, while it is important to address all the ways in which human life is threatened, "abortion remains our preeminent priority as it directly attacks our most vulnerable brothers and sisters, destroying more than a million lives each year in our country alone."<sup>2</sup>

As Pope St. John Paul II wrote, "we are facing an enormous and dramatic clash between good and evil, death and life, the 'culture of death' and the 'culture of life'. ...we are all involved and we all share in it, with the inescapable responsibility of choosing to be unconditionally pro-life."<sup>3</sup>

# "I am with you always, until the end of the age." Matthew 28:20

In the face of challenges such as abortion and physician-assisted suicide, we may feel that we are not equal to the task of overcoming the darkness. Yet, we are not alone. Jesus tells us, "I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

The God who became man to save us still dwells among us. For Christ is "the light [that] shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5). He is the one who overcame death and continually raises us to new life. He remains close to us always, seeking us out in each moment of our lives.

Jesus gave his very flesh to give us the gift of eternal life and invites us to the most profound



experience of this gift in our celebration of the Eucharist. When we meet Jesus in the Eucharist, this encounter has the power to change us. The Eucharist has the power to transform the depths of our hearts and the heart of our culture. United to the power of his Eucharistic Presence, may we work to ensure that each person has life—and has it in abundance.



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


# Option for the Poor & Vulnerable

The Church does not pit one social group against another but instead follows the example of Jesus, who identified with the poor and vulnerable.

The prime purpose of this special commitment to the poor is to enable all persons to share in and contribute to the common good. Those who are oppressed by poverty are the object of a preferential love on the part of the Church which, since her origin and in spite of the failings by many of her members, has not ceased to work for their relief, defense and liberation." Catechism of the Catholic Church nos. 2444, 2448 (quoting St John Paul II, Centisimus Annus, no. 57)

Rather it states that the deprivation and powerlessness of the poor wounds the whole community. The extent of their suffering is a measure of how far we are from being a true community of persons."
